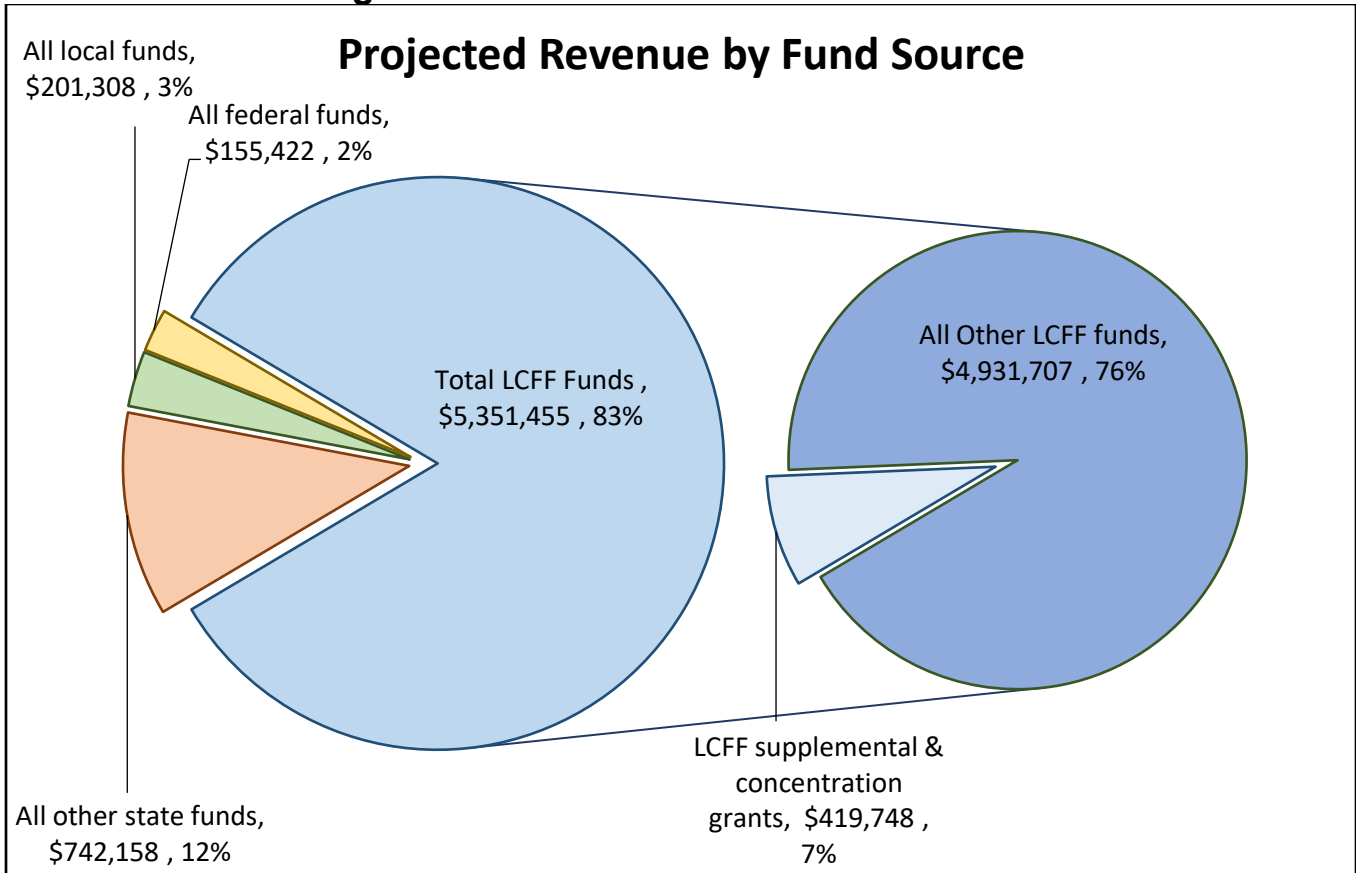

Budget Overview for the 2024-25 School Year

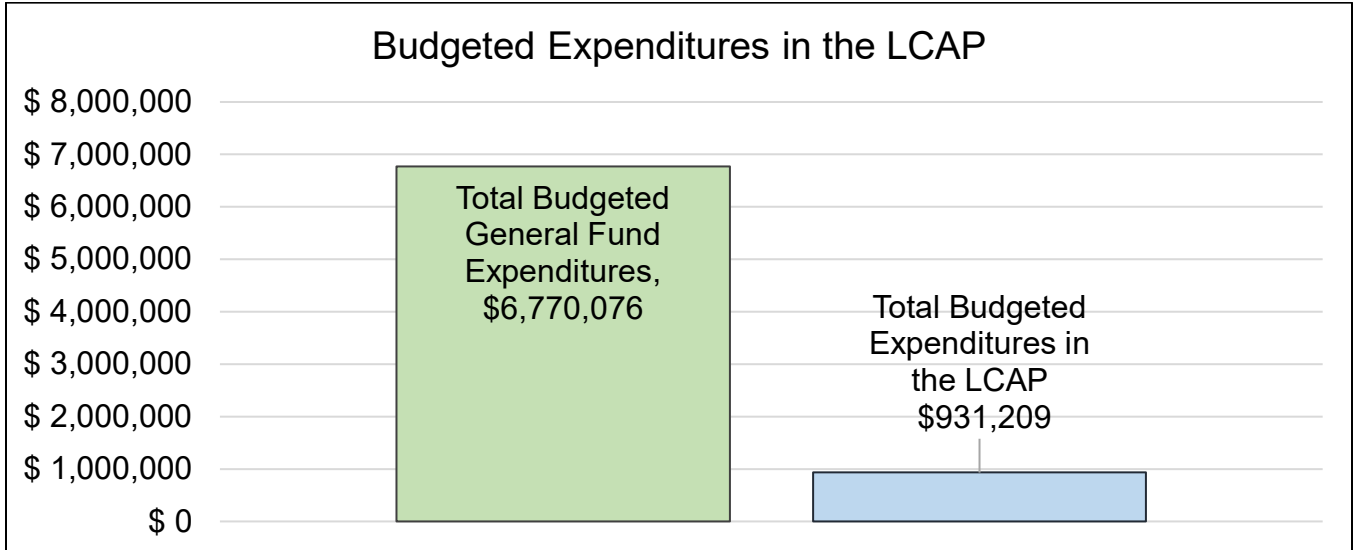


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Soulsbyville Elementary expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Soulsbyville Elementary is \$6,450,343, of which \$5,351,455.00 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$742,158.00 is other state funds, \$201,308.00 is local funds, and \$155,422 is federal funds. Of the \$5,351,455.00 in LCFF Funds, \$419,748.00 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

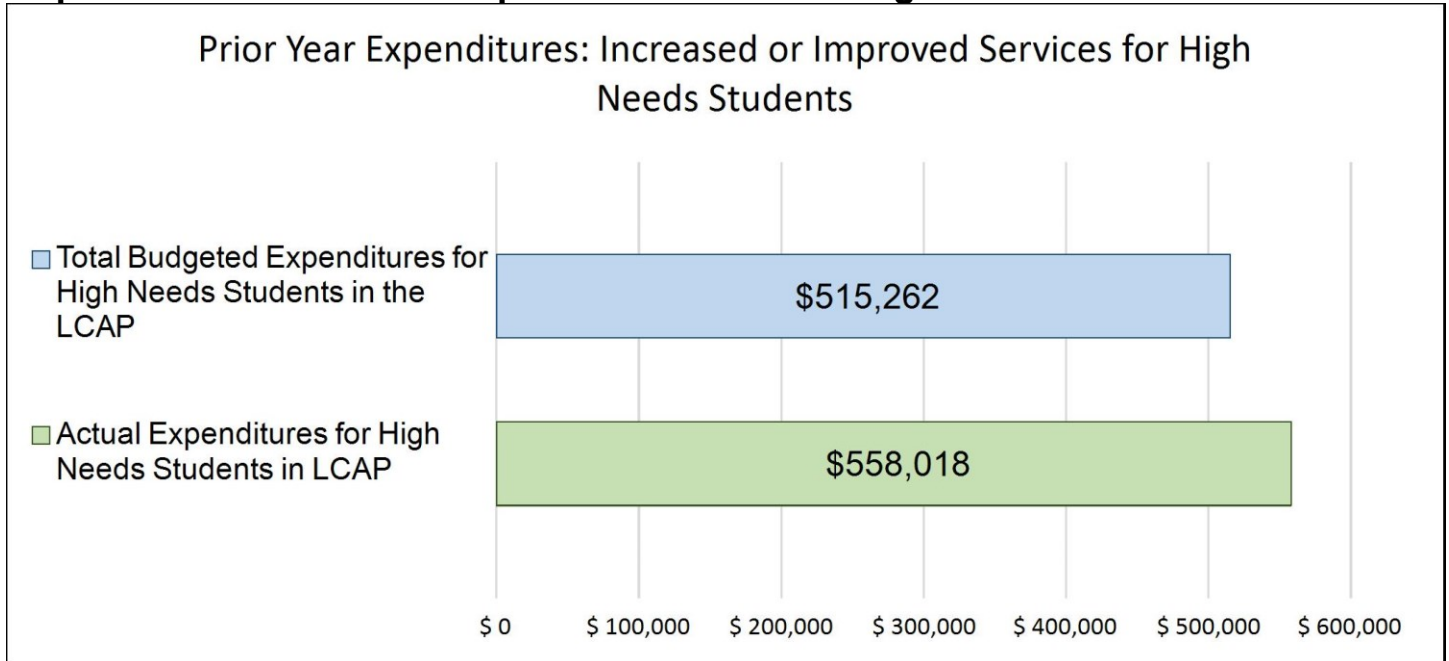

In 2024-25, Soulsbyville Elementary is projecting it will receive \$419,748.00 based on the enrollment of foster youth, English learner, and low-income students. The overall implementation of the actions to achieve this goal have been successful. The district was able to secure quality paraprofessionals to provide both academic and behavioral support for all students especially high needs students. Our PBIS program remained on target and

has earned Platinum status recognition with the State in addition to high marks from our educational partners' feedback on surveys. Technology continued to support student achievement by repairing or replacing old one-to-one chrome books, updating teacher laptops, purchasing licensing for online programming for bench marking, remediation, and enrichment. Some of the challenges experienced with the implementation process were finding qualified, school culture attuned paraprofessionals, and having a pool of substitutes that could step in and continue the support for students without delay or interruptions.

Spent expenditures under Action 1.4 increased from planned expenditures due to the purchase of additional new teacher computers and IEP student Chromebooks.

Actions were effective in meeting this goal. Adding paraprofessional support helped all students make progress both academically and socially as measured by educational partners' input, bench mark testing, and overall classroom success as measured by the teacher. Based on our bench mark math assessments, students went from beginning of the year 45% at or above to end of year 56% at or above standard. Overall school wide scores in Math increased 23.9 points; in Language Arts school wide scores increased 24.8 points. The school attendance rate increased to 93.37% up from 91.75%; chronic absenteeism declined by 7.2%.

The implementation to continue training of students and staff to implement PBIS to strengthen the Multi-Tiered System of Support for all students was successful. Part of that success is the positive buy-in from students, staff, and families to engaged in the PBIS program as noted in our educational partners' feedback on surveys. Those results showed that 93% (up from 90%) of students know and can state our 3 school-wide expectations while 85% (up from 74%) of parents are familiar with these rules. The implementation of morning meetings/advisory class had 91% (up from 86) of students saying they enjoyed this dedicated community building time during each school day. Our Second Step (SEL curriculum) is regularly used by classroom teachers and supported by other staff. Our suspension rate dropped from 1.52% to 1.1%; expulsion rate remained 0%. Students reported on our Climate Survey that 83% of them feel safe at school; 88% of parents report their students feeling safe at school.

The specific actions were effective in our school making progress toward this goal. Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) has been successful in helping our school reach the goal of improving our systems of behavioral and social-emotional learning supports by making data collection easier through our referral process and entry into the SWIS (School wide Information System) electronic data system program. On going staff training and support is also a contributing factor to the progress made in this goal as well as the action expanding our recognition and rewards. School connectedness has consistently improved over 3 years and is now above state average. High expectations, meaningful participation, perceived school safety, positive behavior, parent involvement in schooling, and facilities upkeep all reported above state average. Frequent sadness is down from 37% in 2022 to 10% in 2024. Adults at school care about you is up from 56% in 2022 to 74% in 2024. The school suspension rate dropped 0.4% and attendance rate increased 2%. Overall results from our local climate survey and the California Healthy Kids Survey rate our school high in regards the campus being a safe, welcoming learning environment; 83% reporting feeling safe at school; 90% report knowing the school rules; 82.5% report we have clean/safe facilities.

Plan Summary [2024-25]

General Information

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten–12, as applicable to the LEA.

Soulsbyville School is a TK-8 single school district with approximately 465 students, 74 staff members, (32 certificated personnel, including regular and special education teachers, administrators, a music instructor, highly qualified paraprofessionals) and about 340 families. The demographic makeup up the student population based on 2023-2024 is- .8% American Indian, .6% Filipino, 14.3% Hispanic, and 77.3% White. The student population is further designated; .4% English Learners, 1.2% Foster Youth, 5.2% Homeless, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged 44.2%, and Students with Disabilities 13.4%. It is located in Tuolumne County in a rural mountainous, unincorporated area. Most of our students are bused to school from dissimilar housing subdivisions and land parcels. The population has a range of 0-10 Limited English-Speaking students. In spite of the diverse socioeconomic backgrounds from which they come, students interact very positively with one another at school. Our student population blends together with minimal friction based on social, cultural, or economic prejudice. Our mission is to cultivate excellence: by challenging our students, staff, and school community to reach their maximum potential; by using innovative, enlightening curriculum and educational programs with reliable infrastructure; and by providing technology-embedded instruction

across content areas. In nurturing excellence, we develop learners who are productive workers, effective communicators, resourceful thinkers, and responsive citizens.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

The annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard from school year 2022-2023 and other local data shows that the district is making progress on goals. In academics, Language arts CAASPP scores school wide increased by 24.8 points; in Math CAASPP scores school wide increased by 23.9 points. Homeless increased 64.1 points in Language Arts and are 2.1 points above standard. Homeless also increased 52.3 points in Math. Chronic absenteeism school wide declined 7.2%. School Connectedness has consistently improved over 3 years and is now above state average (CHKS). High expectations, meaningful participation, perceived school safety, positive behavior, parent involvement in schooling, and facilities upkeep all reported above state average (CHKS). Frequent sadness is down from 37% in 2022 to 10% in 2024 (CHKS). Adults at school care about you is up from 56% in 2022 to 74% in 2024 (CHKS). Although our Students with Disabilities (SWD) increased 64.1 points in Language Arts, they are still 93.1 points below standard; SWD increased 19.5 points in Math and are still 107.9 points below standard. Our Two or More Races subgroup had an increased suspension rate by 2.7% and an increased chronic absenteeism rate of 40.5%, up 5.2% (2023 Dashboard). The district will continue to address academic needs of SWD with paraprofessional and other staff support. Students of Two or More Races will continue to have quarterly attendance reviews by administration.

Because of the increase in Chronic Absenteeism Rate among the Multiple Races/Two or More student group, the school was identified as needing additional targeted support and improvement (ATSI). Schools are eligible under the ATSI criteria if one or more student groups: (1) meet the n-size requirements and (2) meet one of three criteria on both the 2022 and 2023 Dashboards. The school was identified for ATSI under Criterion 2, which is the Multiple Races/Two or More student group had all lowest status on all indicators but one. In response to this, the school has made several revisions and updates to its attendance practices. To improve outcomes in this area, the school administration will conduct quarterly attendance reviews with an emphasis on the outcomes for this specific student groups and other groups who are jeopardy of being identified as low performing.

- **Note:** For an action to contribute towards meeting the increased or improved services requirement, it must include some measure of LCFF funding.  - This amount is the total of the Planned Expenditures for Contributing Actions (LCFF Funds) column.
- **5. Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services**
 - This percentage is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**
 - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

Contributing Actions Annual Update Table

Pursuant to *EC* Section 42238.07(c)(2), if the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) is less than the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and Concentration Grants (6), the LEA is required to calculate the difference between the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) and the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (7). - **8. Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (%)**
 - This amount is the total of the Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- **12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)**
 - If the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (11) is less than the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (10), the LEA is required to carry over LCFF funds.

The amount of LCFF funds is calculated by subtracting the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (11) from the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (10) and then multiplying by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9). This amount is the amount of LCFF funds that is required to be carried over to the coming year.

- **13. LCFF Carryover — Percentage (12 divided by 9)**

- This percentage is the unmet portion of the Percentage to Increase or Improve Services that the LEA must carry over into the coming LCAP year. The percentage is calculated by dividing the LCFF Carryover (12) by the LCFF Funding (9).
